The History of KBA

KBA was originally organized as Windward Christian Academy in 1974. Approximately 30 students met in a small A-framed annex building, an old modular real estate office that was moved onto the property. Initially, A.C.E. (Accelerated Christian Education) material was used, enabling the school to teach a wide range of students. Beginning in 1990, the school began to use A Beka Book curriculum in a traditional classroom setting. Over the years, the Lord has blessed Ko'olau Baptist Academy with good growth, both in its academic program and in the number of enrolled students.

Although the Academy has always been an integral part of the religious training of Ko'olau Baptist Church, the name was officially changed to more accurately reflect the true relationship between the church and the school.

Beginning in 1991, Ko'olau Baptist Academy became a member of the American Association of Christian Schools and a charter member of the American Association of Christian Schools - Hawaii. Since its inception, biblical training, affordable tuition, small classes, strong academics, and godly teachers have characterized the distinctively Christian education offered by Ko'olau Baptist Academy.

Mission

As an important ministry of Ko'olau Baptist Church, Ko'olau Baptist Academy seeks to help the families of our church and other families of like faith who desire a distinctly Christian education for their children (Matthew 28:19-20; Ephesians 4:12-14). We come from a Bible-based, Christ-centered approach to education and we seek the mental, physical, social, and spiritual development of every student, that every student might please Jesus Christ with his whole life (II Timothy 3:16-17; Luke 2:52; Romans 12:1-2).

General Philosophy

At Ko'olau Baptist Academy we believe that an eternal God exists and that He has revealed Himself through creation (Psalm 19:1), the incarnation of Jesus Christ (John 1:1-5), and the Bible (II Peter 1:19-21). We believe that God is the ultimate reality in the universe and the One who gives meaning to life. We believe the universe, which He has divinely created and sustains by his power, follows a basic cause and effect pattern, but is open to the supernatural (Colossians 1:16-17). We believe that man has been created in God's image, but is presently in a sin-marred condition and can only be restored by repentance towards God and faith in Jesus Christ and His redemptive work on the cross (Acts 20:21; Romans 3:23, 5:8-9,12; Ephesians 2:8-9). We believe that truth is absolute and objective (John 14:6) and that values are eternal because they are rooted in the nature of God (Exodus 3:13-14).

Philosophy of Education

Because of our belief in God and the Bible, our view of education has been distinctly shaped by biblical principles. This can be seen in how we understand the following areas of education at our school.

Curriculum

Curriculum is the philosophy or guiding set of beliefs that brings shape and definition to an institution's program of study. This guiding set of beliefs governs what should be taught in school (scope), when it should be taught in school (sequence), how it should be taught in school (methodology), and why it should be taught in school (rationale) (Isaiah 28:11). At Ko'olau Baptist Academy our guiding set of beliefs is the Bible, which in turn, shapes and defines our entire program of study (II Timothy 3:16-17).

The Parents

We believe parents are responsible to God for loving, nurturing, and training the children that God has lent unto them. Therefore, we will support the parents who have chosen our school because of our mission and goals by doing our best to educate their children (Ephesians 6:4; Deuteronomy 6:4-9).

The Student

We believe that every child needs to develop spiritually, mentally, socially, and physically to his full potential in Jesus Christ. Therefore, our educational program will seek to develop all four of these areas in the child's life (Luke 2:52).

The Teacher

We believe that teaching is a gift and calling from God. Therefore, the teacher is a divinely delegated authority, who has been gifted by God, to transmit truth and to guide students into all knowledge (I Corinthians 12:28; Romans 12:7). Furthermore, we believe the teacher should be an exemplary role model (I Timothy 4:12).

Instructional Methods

Given the biblical view of man's nature and truth, we believe that a variety of instructional methods are necessary. This includes teacher presentations methods like lecture and drill, but also class participation methods like projects, problem-solving, and role play, to name a few. Thus the teacher is both a teller and a guide, who chooses which methods will best accomplish our instructional objectives (Matthew 5:1-3, 8:1-4, 11:1-3, 13:1-3, 21:28).

Discipline

We believe that discipline problems are problems of the heart. Therefore, we seek to correct not only the child's misbehavior, but also the child's heart through firm and consistent discipline, biblical counseling, and discipleship offered in love and humility (II Timothy 3:16-17).

The Church

We believe that God has ordained the local church to evangelize the world and to edify the saints. Therefore, we will strive to fulfill the Great Commission through the preaching of the gospel to the lost and the education of believers through the local church (Matthew 28:10-20).

The Government

We believe that civil government is ordained of God as a restrainer of sin and sin's destructive effect. Therefore, as Christians, we will obey the government and its regulations as long as it does not go beyond its jurisdiction and violate scriptural principles or commands (Genesis 9:6; Romans 13:1-7).

School Wide Goals

As a school, it is our intent to fulfill our mission by striving to achieve the following goals in the life of every student. Collectively, these goals provide direction for our school and form the basis for evaluating the overall success of our school.

Spiritually, we encourage every student...

- To accept Jesus Christ as his personal Savior and to live his life in such a way that pleases Him (John 1:12; Ephesians 2:8-10);
- To love the Lord with all his heart, soul, and might (Deuteronomy 6:4-6);
- To maintain a regular devotional life with Jesus Christ through Bible reading and prayer (Colossians 1:9-14; II Peter 2:1-30)
- To take an active part in the local church and in sharing the gospel with others (Matthew 28:19-20; Hebrews 10:24-25).

Academically, we want every student...

- To be a proficient reader (Ephesians 3:4);
- To be a competent mathematician (I Corinthians 14:40);
- To be a skilled communicator (Ephesians 4:29);
- To be culturally literate in the social studies (Psalm 104; 107:21-42);
- To be knowledgeable of the world and the universe as God has created them (Colossians 1:15-17; I Timothy 6:20);
- To be appreciative of music and the arts (I Corinthians 14:33);
- To be computer literate and skilled in the basic technologies that is related to learning and to be prepared for future job training or higher education (I Timothy 5:8).

Socially, we challenge every student...

- To love his neighbor as himself (Matthew 19:19);
- To exert a righteous influence in the world for Christ's sake (Matthew 5:13-16);
- To be a productive worker and good citizen in the community (Matthew 5:13-16);
- To maintain right relationships with friends, family members, co-workers, and non-Christians according to Biblical principles (Ephesians 4:32); and

- To develop character traits consistent with Biblical values (Galatians 5:22-23; I Peter 1:5-8).

Physically, we desire every student...

- To regularly practice basic habits of good health
- To maintain an appropriate level of physical fitness necessary for good health (I Corinthians 6:19-20).

Doctrinal Statement

Since KBA is a ministry of Ko'olau Baptist Church, the doctrinal position of the church is taught by the school. Highlights of Ko'olau Baptist Church's Statement of Faith are as follows:

- We believe the Bible to be the verbally inspired, totally accurate, only inspired Word of God (II Timothy 3:16-17).
- We believe in the one Triune God, eternally existing in three Persons (Deuteronomy 6:4-6).
- We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ became man, without ceasing to be God, having been conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of a virgin, Mary, that He might reveal God and redeem sinful man (Isaiah 7:14; Luke 1:35; Philippians 2:5-8).
- We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ accomplished our redemption through His death on the cross and that our justification is made sure by His physical resurrection from the dead (Romans 3:24-25).
- We believe the Holy Spirit is a Person who convicts the world of sin, of righteousness, and of judgment. The Holy Spirit indwells and seals every believer. We believe that the sign gifts of the Holy Spirit, such as speaking in tongues, were temporary and have ceased (John 16:8-11; Romans 8:9; I Corinthians 12:4-11, 28; Ephesians 4:7-12).
- We believe that man was created in the image of God, but inherited a sinful nature through Adam's fall (Romans 3:22-23; 5:12; 6:23).

- We believe that salvation is the gift of God to man, given by grace and received by personal faith in the Lord Jesus Christ (John 1:12; Ephesians 1:8; 2:8-10).
- We believe that all the redeemed, once saved, are kept by God's power and are thus secure in Christ forever (John 6:37-40).
- We believe in the bodily resurrection of all men, the saved to life eternal in heaven, and the unsaved to judgment and everlasting punishment in hell (John 5:28-29; 11:25-26).
- We believe that all the saved should live in such a manner as not to bring reproach upon their Savior and Lord (Romans 12:1-2; 14:13).

A complete copy of the Church's Statement of Faith and Church Constitution is available from the school office.

Admission

KBA sets high academic and spiritual standards for its students. Specific information about the school including tuition, fees, and application forms may be obtained from the school office by mail or in person.

Requirements

Before being fully accepted, prospective students must give evidence of their ability to benefit from KBA by:

- Completing all application forms,
- Providing the school with a copy of the student's latest report card, standardized test scores, and securing a release card from their previous school,
- Successfully completing an interview with either the principal or the pastor,
- Submitting proof of tuberculosis clearance and current immunization record,
- Agreeing to the rules and policies of Ko'olau Baptist Academy and faithfully attending an approved Christian church on a weekly basis. Elementary students must attend a minimum of one service per week. Upper Division students must attend at least one service per week.

Procedures

The enrollment process requires completion of the following steps:

1. Request an enrollment package from the school office either by mail or in person. Read the material carefully.
2. Turn in the application form. The office will call you to schedule an enrollment interview. Prospective students should attend the interview. Parents should also bring a copy of the student's report card and any recent standardized test scores.
3. After the interview, the parents may submit the application form and schedule a placement test with the school office. The school will notify the parents whether the child is accepted after receiving all of the requested information.
4. After receiving notification of acceptance, the parent should make arrangements with the school office concerning finances, testing, uniforms, transfer of school records, and health requirements.

Non-discriminatory Policy

KBA does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, sex, or disability in the administration of its educational or admissions policies, subject to and in conformity with the church's religious beliefs and practice as embodied in its rules and practices.

Finances

KBA believes that parents have the primary responsibility for the education of their children. Therefore, parents must be willing to assume the financial obligations associated with their children's education.

Enrollment/Re-enrollment Fee

All new and returning students are required to pay an enrollment/re-enrollment fee. The enrollment/re-enrollment fee reserves a place in the classroom for your child. The enrollment/re-enrollment fee is non-refundable.

Comprehensive Fee

A comprehensive fee is charged to all students. The comprehensive fee helps to cover the expense of textbook rental, annual testing, P.E. equipment, yearbook, arts and crafts material, etc. The comprehensive fee is non-refundable.

Tuition

KBA is committed to keeping tuition as low as possible while still providing a sound academic program. Current tuition charges are available from the school office.

Tuition Payments

There are three options from which a family may choose to pay their tuition. They are as follows:

By the year.....	\$100 discount
By the semester.....	\$75 discount
By the monthly payments.....	No discount

Late Fee

Accounts not paid by the 20th of each month will be assessed a \$15 late fee as well as a \$40.00 follow-up fee from Smart Tuition, our tuition business partner. In addition, the child(ren) will not be allowed to continue in class until the account is made current.

Tutoring

After school tutoring (one-to-one instruction on a regular basis) is available. Please see the office for current charges. Teachers at KBA are always willing to help any student on an occasional basis for no charge.

*Some high school courses may require a fee for supplies; i.e. biology, art, etc.

Early Withdrawals

The school must be notified at the beginning of the school year about any child who will be leaving school before the end of the semester. If the withdrawal is to be made at least 30 days before the last day of the semester, then the tuition will be pro-rated on a monthly basis. If not, full payment for that semester will be required. Emergency withdrawals will be handled in a similar manner. Students leaving during the last half of the final quarter of the school year may receive credit for the entire year, provide all work is completed, but they will need to pay the semester's tuition in full.

Graduation Fees

Each Kindergarten graduate will be charged a \$30.00 matriculation fee. The fee covers the cost of diploma, gift Bible, and graduation cap with tassel. Payment must be made prior to graduation. Each high school graduate will be charged a \$50.00 matriculation fee. The fee pays for transcripts, cap and gown, and diploma. Payment must be made prior to graduation.

Counseling

Counseling and Guidance

Part of the unique experience students discover at KBA, is the close relationship between students and their teachers. Caring teachers desire not just to teach their students how to make a living, but how to live. The faculty is always ready to talk with students about the difficulties and problems they might be experiencing. An appointment for more formal counseling can be made through the school office.

Academic Information

Textbooks

Primarily, the Academy uses a combination of textbooks from distinctively Christian publishers, A Beka Books and Bob Jones Press. Both of the publishers present their material from a theistic world-view. Occasionally, a textbook will be used from another source.

Progress Reports

Report Cards

Report cards are released to the parents approximately one week after each grading period. It is not the only way to show parents how a student is generally performing in class. No report card is completely satisfactory in communicating a student's progress.

Therefore, conferences, notes, and telephone calls are also helpful in communicating a student's accomplishments.

Mid-Quarter Reports

Mid-Quarter reports are sent home during the middle of each quarter. They are designed to inform parents of their child's progress or deficiencies.

Parent –Teacher Conferences

Parent-Teacher Conferences are offered for all parents prior to the first and third quarters. The school office will make appointments for each family. These appointments with the teacher are important in order for the teacher to communicate with the parents about their child’s progress. Conferences with the administrator or teachers may also be requested at any time by calling the school office.

Graduation Requirements

High School diplomas are issued on the basis of credits earned. Students typically earn .5 credits per semester for classes that meet five times a week or .5 credits per year for classes that meet twice a week.

Electives

Although the number of electives offered at KBA is limited, students who are in good academic standing may choose Accounting, Art, Choir, Computer Literacy, Study Hall, Teacher's Aide, Speed Reading and other courses that may be available. In addition to these electives that are offered periodically, students may also take correspondence courses offered by the University of Nebraska or classes utilizing Accelerated Christian Education (A.C.E.) materials.

Adding or Dropping Courses

Electives and core classes may be added to a student's schedule with administrative approval. Classes may be dropped at the request of the parents or because of academic probation. After the first two weeks of class, no refund will be given for electives requiring a user fee.

Homework

Homework assignments are an important part of the learning process and must be completed as assigned. In some classes, homework is given as review and is necessary for mastery of the subject; i.e. history or literature. In every class it is an important part of learning and should be completed consistently and conscientiously. Student should keep a homework notebook.

Certain assignments may take longer. However, in most cases, students can expect the following amount of home study:

Grade K-2	15-45 minutes daily
Grade 3-6	30-60 minutes daily
Grade 7-12	30-90 minutes daily

Extra Help Sessions

It is our desire for every student to have a successful learning experience while at KBA. Teachers are always willing to give eager students extra help. If students need extended help, then it is recommended that arrangements be made for formal tutoring. See the school office for additional information, costs, and scheduling.

Academic Probation

Any student who earns less than a 2.00 G.P.A. during any quarter will be placed on academic probation. An academic counselor will be assigned to monitor the student's progress. The academic counselor along with the parents and student will devise and implement an appropriate plan to raise the student's grade. Part of their strategy may include remedial classes, tutoring, extra study halls, and limiting extra-curricular events. Students who repeatedly find themselves on academic probation may be asked to withdraw from school.

Retention in Grade

Students who do not master key performance objectives are subject to being retained at the same grade level the following year. Parents will be notified at the end of the school year what concepts their child has not mastered. At the end of the summer, the student will be tested again. If the concepts have been mastered, then the student will be promoted to the next grade, otherwise the student will be retained in grade.

Testing

Several tests are administered yearly to monitor the student's progress.

Placement Testing

Placement tests are usually given to new students before they begin regular classroom instruction. Recent standardized test results may be sufficient to meet this requirement. These tests are used to determine the student's ability to perform at expected levels.

Achievement / Ability Testing

The IOWA Test is given each year in April and the Otis-Lennon School Ability Test (OLSAT) is given every other year in April. Results of the tests are mailed to the parents for their records.

Learning Disabilities

If the parent or teachers suspect that a child might have a learning disability, then the administration will recommend that the parents request the Hawaii State Department of Education to evaluate the student or the parents may choose to have a private source conduct the testing. The testing provided by the state of Hawaii is free and a right of every citizen.

Honor Code

Students at KBA are expected to maintain high personal standards. Cheating on any exam, project, or homework assignment will result in a “0” for the assignment and disciplinary action. Any student who provides answers to another student in order that they may cheat will be disciplined accordingly.

Academic Honors

Elementary students who earn all “A’s” will be placed on the “All A Honor Roll.” Students who earn all “A’s” & “B’s” will be placed on the “A-B Honor Roll.” Only grades in Bible, Reading/Phonics, Language, Mathematics, Science, and History will be used to determine elementary honor roll students.

Upper division students (grades 7-12) earn academic honor based on their overall G.P.A. Students who earn a 3.25 G.P.A. or better will be placed on the honor roll.

Valedictorian and Salutatorian

The Valedictorian and Salutatorian for the graduating class will be determined according to G.P.A. The recipients of the awards will be honored at their graduation ceremony. Recipients must have a minimum of 3.50 G.P.A.

Eligibility for Extra-Curriculum Activities

All students participating in extra-curricular events must maintain a 2.00 G.P.A. and may not have earned an “F” in any subject. Eligibility will be determined by quarterly grades. Eligibility may be reinstated as soon as the student’s quarterly report card shows a 2.00 G.P.A. (or better) and no “F’s”.

Summer School Classes

Upper division students who wish to enroll in summer school courses for credit at other schools must consult with the principal of KBA first. KBA may not accept credit for any summer class that is normally taught in the regular school year at KBA. Parents may wish to inquire at the school office about summer correspondence classes or tutoring offered through KBA. Ko'olau Baptist Academy offers summer school for elementary and junior high students.

Standards of Conduct

Self discipline is essential in the development of godly character. Students should be taught what is right, based on biblical principles. When biblical principles are violated, students should be reprovved, corrected, and then taught how to do what is right (II Timothy 3:16). It is our desire that the Academy's policies and standards of conduct should reinforce the values of your family. Parents of kindergarten and elementary students must willingly agree in writing to support their child by supporting all school rules, policies, and standards. All upper division students and their parents must agree in writing to support and comply with the school rules, policies, and standards.

General Conduct

Students should seek to please the Lord at all times.

They should not seek to mimic or promote non-Christian values. Students are to obey and show proper respect toward those who are in authority over them.

Students are expected to use appropriate language at all times.

Swearing or coarse talk inconsistent with Christian values is not permitted.

Student behavior in the classroom is to be conducive to learning.

This would include being on time, being prepared for class, and following directions. Disruptive behavior, communicating without permission, and chewing gum or eating candy in class is not permitted.

Students are to respect the private property of others.

They are not to borrow items without permission. They are not to deface school textbooks, desks, lockers, or property. Any act of vandalism will result in demerits and require restitution.

Students are to respect one another.

There is to be no name calling, teasing, racial slurs, acts of aggression, rough play, fighting, or remarks/actions that might be construed as sexual harassment.

Students are to maintain high standards of personal integrity.

Lying, cheating, or stealing will result in serious disciplinary action. Immorality will result in expulsion.

Students are to abide by the state and federal penal code.

This would include, but is not limited to, laws governing alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, carrying concealed weapons, theft, and tampering with the fire alarm system. Violations may result in immediate expulsion.

Students are to obey all administrative directives as found in the handbook and such that may be added from time to time.

General Dress Standards

KBA emphasizes that students should always dress modestly, appropriately, and as a good example at all times. The following guidelines apply to both the school uniform and other clothes worn to school and school events.

Specifically for Boys

- Dress Trousers must be neat and in good condition. They should not be tight-fitting or excessively baggy. On trousers with belt loops, belts must be worn and trousers should never sag below the waist.
- Only dress blue trousers may be worn with the uniform (Elementary boys). Only dress khaki trousers may be worn with the uniform (7th-12th grade boys).
- Dress shoes or athletic shoes are permitted. Laces must be laced up and tied at all times. Please no sandals or slippers.
- Shirts must have a collar and all appropriate buttons must be fastened. Shirts with tails must be tucked into the trousers.
- Boys are expected to maintain clean-looking, tapered haircuts. Specifically, the hair should not touch the eyebrows or collar and should not hang over the ears. Sideburns should extend no longer than the middle of the ear. Hair may not be tinted. Distinct lines caused by different lengths of hair are not permitted. Boys who come to school with unacceptable haircuts may be sent home until corrected.
- Boys may not wear earrings, necklaces, or bracelets/wristbands. Furthermore, baseball caps or hats may not be brought to school or school-related events without permission.

Specifically for Girls

- (7th – 12th grade) The length of skirts and dresses must reach the middle of the knee while standing.
- Please, no slits or tight fitting skirts/dresses. Necklines must be modest in all cases.
- Shorts, leggings, or rolled up pants are not to be visible under the skirt.
- Shoes, sneakers, or sandals may be worn to school. Laces must be laced up and tied at all times. Please, no slippers.
- (Elementary) Skorts must be modest, appropriate, and a good example.
- Please, no excessive use of cosmetics or jewelry.

In all matters of dress, the judgment of the administrator will be final. The administrator reserves the right to make necessary changes in the dress code because of changing styles.

Uniforms

Uniforms are to be ordered and purchased directly from the local uniform company the school is under contract with. It is recommended that parents purchase at least two sets of uniforms. Please see the school office for brochures, order forms, and current prices. Uniforms are to be kept clean and neat in appearance.

Sometimes, due to unforeseen circumstances, the student might not be able to wear his uniform. Therefore, twice each semester students are allowed to wear other clothes provided they meet the dress standard.

P.E. Uniforms

The mandatory P.E. uniform for 7th-12th grade consists of a KBA T-shirt and KBA shorts for boys and girls. KBA T-shirts and shorts can be purchased from the school bookstore.

Dating

In order to provide an environment conducive to a pure lifestyle and promote wholesome relationships, KBA students must willingly abide on and off campus by the Academy's dating policy. Dating is only permitted for 11th and 12th grade students who have permission from their parents or guardians. Younger students are not permitted to date. Furthermore, all students are to conduct themselves in a manner that honors the Lord Jesus Christ and in a way that is above reproach. Specifically, students are not to be alone with members of the opposite sex; nor are there to be any physical contact between members of the opposite sex while at school or school related events.

Because we live in an extremely promiscuous society where premarital sex among teenagers is common, it is important that we establish this high standard. We trust that this policy will provide our teenagers with the freedom to develop wholesome relationships, strong friendships, and a right view of themselves. Furthermore, we trust that this policy will protect our students from the sin, guilt, and consequences associated with immorality.

If a boy-girl relationship exceeds that of being very good friends and degenerates into a possessive and/or physical relationship that excludes others and hinders the learning environment at school, then the school will take corrective action. Failure to abide by the school policy will lead to dismissal. Parents/Guardians must support their child by supporting the school's dating policy at home or their child will not be allowed to continue at KBA.

Music

Music is an important part of our lives and a powerful means of communication and persuasion. Therefore, it is important that the music (lyrics, melody, and rhythm) we listen to for worship and entertainment be honoring to the Lord Jesus Christ and consistent with Christian values. Students at KBA must choose not to listen to music that does not honor the Lord; this would include rock music (all kinds including soft, "Christian," heavy metal, etc.) country western, rap, reggae, CCM, etc. This rule also applies to watching MTV and attending concerts. The school expects the students to abide by this rule and the parents to help enforce this rule.

Discipline

Classroom Behavior

Every teacher at KBA is expected to use appropriate classroom management techniques to ensure that proper classroom decorum is maintained. This involves correcting behavior problems before they become disruptive, establishing and enforcing clear classroom rules, and working with parents to change undesirable behavior. Elementary teachers may isolate or restrict students from certain activities for violating classroom rules. Teachers in grades 7-12 may issue detention for students who violate classroom rules.

Students who violate the schools standards of conduct will be referred to the administration for counseling and disciplinary action (Detention, Suspension, and Expulsion). Students involved in drinking, illegal drugs, or immorality will be expelled.

Parental Support

Every parent wants to support his child. The best way you can support your child is by supporting your child's school in matters of discipline. We are on you and your child's side and only desire to see your child succeed academically, spiritually, and socially. If your child continually misbehaves in class or violates the school's general Standard of Conduct, then he will be sent to the office. In serious cases, you will be notified and asked to discipline your child. If the child is repeatedly sent to the office and your discipline efforts are ineffective, then you will be asked to withdraw your child from school.

The administration also reserves the right to ask students to withdraw from school at any time whose attitude and/or lifestyle are not in agreement with the philosophy and aims of the school.

Appeals

The administration of KBA is more than willing to discuss your concerns related to discipline. The parents may also appeal to the Ko'olau Baptist Academy School Board in writing and request a meeting to appeal any discipline related decisions made by the administration. The school board for KBA is made up of the pastor, deacons, and trustees of Ko'olau Baptist Church.

Health and Safety

Health Records

Students entering any school in the State of Hawaii for the first time must:

- Complete a physical examination by a licensed physician or have had one within a year of the date of entry of school.
- Be immunized according to the State Department of Health's regulations governing communicable diseases and produce proof of clearance from tuberculosis (required before attending any class). A free skin test is available from the State Department of Health.
- A Form 14 Health Record is required for attendance. It must be filled out and signed by the child's physician.

Illnesses and Injuries

Should a student become sick or is injured while at school, the parents will be notified. The student will be placed in the school office until he is picked up. It is the parent's responsibility to make arrangements for someone to pick up their child at school. Please do not delay in picking up your child from the school office if they are ill.

The school will not administer over-the-counter medication, including aspirin.. Small wounds and abrasions will be cleansed and bandaged. Students with more serious injuries will be taken to a doctor or an emergency clinic after a reasonable attempt to contact the parents has been made.

Pre-existing Conditions

The parents must identify in writing on the student's application form of any chronic illnesses a student might have; including, but not limited to asthma, heart conditions, diabetes, hemophilia, hepatitis, HIV+, etc..

The school must also be told in writing what should be done in the event such a student suffers an attack or becomes seriously ill. Students who need to take prescription medication at school will need a note from their parents and the medicine must be kept in the office.

Attendance Requirements

Attendance is required at all classes. Please call the school office in the morning if your child is going to be absent from school.

Absences are classified according to the following conditions:

Excused Absence - Given to a student who misses all or part of a school day for illness, doctor's appointments, or death in the immediate family.

Pre-excused Absence - Given to a student who knows he will be absent. The student must bring a note explaining why the student will miss school and secure all homework assignments, and make arrangements for any tests, quizzes, projects that might be given during the student's absence.

Late Arrivals - Given to students who are late to school. Students who are late to school must come to the office and check in with the attendance secretary. Students in grades 7-12 will be given 30 minutes detention for each late arrival over six.

Tardy - Given to a student in grades 7-12 who is late to any class after the first class. Students must go to the office and get an unexcused tardy pass. 7-12 grade students will receive 30 minutes detention for being tardy.

Early Dismissal

If you must pick up your child early from school, please go to the office and request an Early Dismissal Pass. If anyone other than the parent is to pick up the child, then please call the school office or send a note with your child. Please do not go directly to any classroom to pick up a child. Go to the office first.

Church Attendance

Besides attending every class, Upper division students (7-12) are required to attend Ko'olau Baptist Church at least once a week. There are 3 services on Sunday (Sunday School , Morning, and Evening) and one service Wednesday evening. Church attendance will be monitored.

Miscellaneous

Athletics

KBA successfully competes with other schools in volleyball, basketball, and soccer for boys and girls. Students must meet all eligibility requirements and obtain parental permission. This includes signing an accident/injury waiver.

Games and practices are held after school and it is the student's responsibility to arrange for transportation. There is a small fee charged to all participating students to defray the cost of gym rental, referees, and equipment.

Automobiles

High school students who drive to school must exert great care; especially while driving on the church property. Unsafe driving actions by students will cause them to lose their parking privileges at KBA.

Awards

The opportunity to earn special recognition and awards is a strong motivator for many students. Besides giving out awards throughout the school year, KBA concludes the school year with an Awards Night and Open House for elementary students and an Awards Banquet for upper division students. Attendance is strongly encouraged. Special awards given include: The Teacher's Award for best student in each class; the Principal's Award for highest G.P.A.; the Pastor's Award for character and leadership; the Onesimus Award for displaying a Servant's heart, and Bible Memorization for memorizing Scripture. Other awards include highest average in certain classes and participation awards.

Birthdays

Parents of kindergarten and elementary students are more than welcome to work with their teachers in arranging birthday parties. Because of our heavy academic load, maximum time should not exceed one hour including the half-hour lunch period. Upper Division students will not be allowed to celebrate birthdays during class.

Closed Campus

All requests to leave the school grounds while school is in session must be approved by the principal. Any student who leaves without permission will be considered truant. The school will take appropriate disciplinary action.

Unannounced or unauthorized visitors to school will not be permitted.

Damage to Property

The parents or legal guardians of students who damage school or church property by negligence or misuse are liable for replacement or repair of the property.

Disclaimer of Liability

Ko'olau Baptist Church will not be financially responsible for any injuries or accidents that may occur at school or the church before or after normal school hours should parents or legal guardians leave their children unsupervised during these times.

Field Trips

During the school year, the students will go on excursions or have activities which will necessitate transportation and/or admission charges. The homes will be notified about the cost ahead of time. Parents are always welcome to help as chaperones, but non-school children are not permitted. Field trips that are educational in nature are not optional; they are part of the learning experience at KBA.

Head Lice

Head lice are a common problem in Hawaii due to the weather. It is not related to family cleanliness. We will notify you if we suspect your child has head lice by sending a letter home with them. This letter has instructions for dealing with the problem. Please understand, if your child receives such a notice, it is not a reflection on your family, but simply a problem in Hawaii that must be dealt with.

Insurance

KBA does carry liability insurance covering the students while they are at school during normal hours of operation and while they are on field trips. Because of the rising cost of insurance, the school's policy does not include athletic games and after-school practices. Parents of athletes participating in inter-scholastic sports must sign a consent form assuming financial responsibility for any injuries to their child. No student will be allowed to participate without his guardians signing the release form.

Lockers

All students in grades 7-12 will be provided a locker to use. All lockers are property of the school and are subject to periodic inspections. They are to be kept in a neat and orderly manner at all times. Students should not keep any items of value in the lockers.

Using locks is left up to the discretion of each student; however, the school will not be responsible for stolen items under any circumstances

Lost and Found

Students will be charged \$1.00 to reclaim items and \$5.00 to reclaim textbooks from lost and found. Articles left in lost and found for more than 30 days will be disposed of at the administration's discretion.

Off Limits

Because of the unique characteristics of our church property, students will be restricted from certain areas of the property. Each semester the teacher will remind their students of those areas designated as "Off Limits."

Parties

Both the elementary school and upper division students will have a party day prior to Christmas vacation. The elementary school will celebrate the end-of-the-school year with a picnic. Parties or the bringing of snacks or refreshments at other times of the year must be approved in advance by the principal through the classroom teacher.

Required Functions

Students are required to attend all scheduled class activities related to the curriculum. Grades may be reduced for not attending required functions. Attendance at other events is strongly encouraged.

Room Mothers and Fathers

Moms, dads, and grandparents are encouraged to become actively involved in the education of their children. Helping with field trips, class parties, special art projects, or P.E. is always appreciated. All volunteers must dress according to school standards. Please see the principal if you would like to help on a regular basis.

School Hours

The school day for students in grades kindergarten thru 6th grade is Monday through Friday from 8:15 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and 8:15 a.m. to 2:45 p.m. for students 7th-12th grade. Supervised care will be provided from 7:00 a.m.-7:45a.m. at the school library. A school calendar (which lists all holidays and special events) is available from the school office.

Storms and Disasters

Parents should use sound judgment as to their children's welfare. Do not send your children to school if Kaneohe or your neighborhood is under a "Flood Warning." In most cases the school will attempt to notify parents if the school is to be closed. You may also listen to the radio for announcements as well. If an emergency occurs at the school, the school will be evacuated to Kapunahala Elementary School and notify you how to pick up your children. This is part of a reciprocal emergency contingency plan worked out between KBA and Kapunahala Elementary School.

Telephone Calls

The school office phone is for official use. Important messages for students will be delivered at an appropriate time. Students will be called to the phone during school hours only in the case of an emergency. Students may use the phone only after securing permission first. Students are not to use cellular phones at school during school hours.

Textbooks

Textbooks are the property of the school and are issued by the school. Re-useable textbooks are to be covered by the student with an appropriate book cover. The student's name and the title of the book should be written neatly on the outside. Book covers must be replaced if they become torn or soiled. At no time is a student to write in, tear, damage, or turn under the pages of any re-useable textbook. Fines will be assessed for damage to textbooks. In the event a student loses a textbook (missing for more than a week), the student must purchase a new one through the school office.

Transportation

KBA provides transportation for field trips and extra-curricular activities. There may be a nominal charge for bus rental. Students are to abide by all safety rules and the directions of the bus driver while on the bus.

Unauthorized Items

In order to help students stay focused on learning, the following items are not permitted at school: headphones, mp3 players, electronic games, toys, magazines not related to classroom studies, cards, trading cards, milk caps, laser pointers, weapons, or fireworks of any kind.

Visitors

Parents are always welcome to visit their child's class and are encouraged to do so. However, non-family members must secure the principal's approval at least 48 hours prior to visiting. All visitors must observe the same dress code as *students*.

Withdrawal Policy

Students must be formally withdrawn from KBA before any records will be transferred to another school. Students must return all school owned materials. The parents are responsible for full payment of all charges. Records will not be released until all conditions are met and a request is made from another school.

Yearbook

The yearbook is published annually for the interest and enjoyment of our student. The comprehensive fee covers the cost of the yearbook.

Notification of No Asbestos

Asbestos, a mineral made of many fibers, is known to be the cause of several lung diseases, including cancer; however, it has many redeeming qualities, such as being fire-resistant and strong, which makes it ideal to use in construction materials. It is found in everything from roofing materials, decorative ceiling sprays, and gypsum boards to concrete blocks, floor tiles, and insulation.

Asbestos is only hazardous when the microscopic fibers are inhaled. The purpose of the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) is to get schools to either remove the asbestos from their buildings or at least keep the fibers from entering the air. Hawaii schools are fortunate to have very little asbestos in their buildings and virtually nothing that would pose an immediate health hazard. Ko'olau Baptist Academy hired an EPA accredited asbestos inspector to inspect our school buildings. **The inspection and results of laboratory analysis show that there is no friable asbestos containing materials in our school.**

Each school is required to develop and submit to the State an Asbestos Management Plan. Our school's Management Planner was prepared by an EPA accredited Management Planner and submitted to the Department of Health by the October 12, 1988 deadline. The State has not rejected our Management Plan (which is their way of accepting it).
